

Thank you for teaching us how to do this.





Success at school starts with **attendance**

There are **175 non school days** a year – that's 175 days to spend on family time, appointments, holidays, shopping and everything else.

There are 190 school days each year	181 days at school means
No lost learning =	...9 days of missed learning =
100% attendance	96% attendance

Good

Best chance of success and gets your child off to a flying start!



171 days at school means	161 days at school means
...19 days of missed learning =	...29 days of missed learning =
90% attendance	85% attendance

Worrying

Less chance of success and makes it harder to make progress.



152 days at school means	143 days at school means
...38 days of missed learning =	...47 days of missed learning =
80% attendance	75% attendance
