Transition Worship

Please can all children be taken to their new classroom at 8:45am and then parents will enter the hall from the playground to wait for the service to begin at 9:00am.

Family Craft afternoon

We are really excited to invite parents into our school for our family craft afternoon on Wednesday 6th September from 2pm - 4pm. Please can parents enter school via the main office doors, find their respective child(ren)'s name on the signing in sheets, and a member of staff will guide you to the relevant classrooms if you require assistance. Each class will compose a family portrait for you to take home.

<u>Uniform</u>

As you are aware our uniform is important to us and we know that it gives a sense of pride and belonging within the school community. Our uniform is designed to make life straightforward for our children and to allow them to work easily and safely so that they can make learning their priority. We know that a high standard of uniform has a positive impact on behaviour in school and on making a calm, purposeful working environment for all children. When children are dressed in the correct school uniform, they are positive role models for their peers and present a positive image of the school in the local community. It is also a way of preparing the children for secondary school where they will be expected to wear full uniform everyday.



Please can you make every effort to ensure your child is dressed in the correct uniform as stated below:

- Tops should be white can be a shirt or polo shirt.
- Bottoms should be grey can be trousers, shorts, knee length skirt or dress.
- Jumpers/Cardigans should be plain blue.
- Socks/Tights should be black, white or grey.
- Shoes should be black. They must be flat shoes and <u>no trainers</u>.
- Jewellery watches and single stud earrings only (must be removed for P.E)
- No smart watches should be worn.
- Makeup and nail varnish is not to be worn.

<u>P.E. kit</u>


- Black shorts or jogging style bottoms
- Plain white t-shirt
- Black sand-shoes or trainers

Due to hygiene reasons - the expectation is that all children must wear an appropriate P.E. kit in order to take part in their weekly P.E. lesson.

We have sent out our Free School Meal form as in addition to free meals at school, you may be eligible for a free uniform - please note this does not affect your benefits. If you are struggling to fill out any of the forms we have sent home please drop into the school office and a member of staff will be more than happy to help.

Water bottles

Recently there have been instances in which water bottles have been knocked over on tables and spilled over the children's work. Children have become upset as their books and work have been damaged. In order for this to be prevented please could water bottles have sports caps on them to reduce the amount of spillages.



Packed lunches and snacks

In September all packed lunches will be brought to the dinner hall after registration: this means that children will not be able to access them until lunch time. If you are sending a healthy snack for the children to eat at break time please can you ensure that it is stored in their school bag or coat pocket.

Reading books

In September all children will receive a new reading record and reading book. It is really important that children read at least three times a week and change their books regularly. In Key Stage One children will be given a reading folder and book that is matched to their phonic knowledge that needs to be brought in each Friday. These books are priced at approximately £8.50 each therefore if any are lost there will be a charge so that they can be replaced. In Key Stage Two children will be expected to bring their reading records and books daily so that they are able to access and change their books regularly. If your child loses their reading records they can be replaced for 50p.

In the Spring term we visited East Park, looking for signs of seasonal change and habitats. The children demonstrated outstanding behavioural expectations. The children were so excited and demonstrated their knowledge of the world around




Creativity unleashed

More compliments came from Dearne Valley, where the staff praised the pupils for their manners and behaviour whilst on the residential trip. We are so proud of how the children have


